Rosa Parks

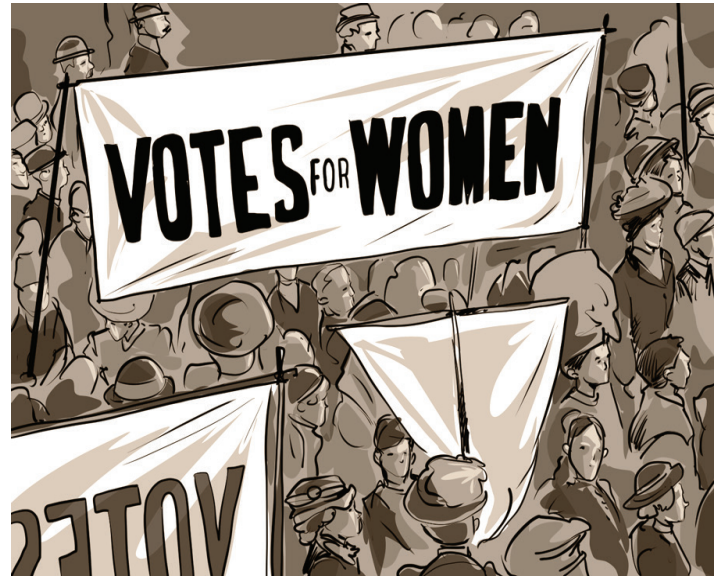

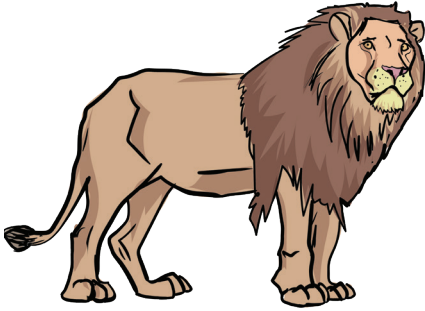
